Each year the school collects the views of its stakeholders. We gather opinions through talking with School Council, questionnaires, parent groups, and face to face communication.

Our most recent survey was the annual parent questionnaire. We asked a range of questions to collect your views; this was based on a scale - strongly agree to strongly disagree. You also had the opportunity to share your written thoughts with us. This style of questionnaire was used as it mirrors the Parent View questionnaire and enables us to directly compare the results year on year as well as against other schools. Parent View is a web site designed to collect the views of parents. It provides the chance for you to say what you think about your child's school, from the quality of teaching to dealing with bullying and poor behaviour.



We also gather your views at our parent evenings. Governors attend the evening to speak with you face to face, enabling you to share your thoughts about the school.






2. My child is safe at Rhodes Avenue Primary School







3. My child makes good progress at Rhodes Avenue Primary school

5. My child is taught well at Rhodes Avenue Primary School









7. Pupils are Rhodes Avenue are well behaved.




8. I am happy that Rhodes Avenue deals with bullying effectively




9. Rhodes Avenue is well led and managed




10. Rhodes Avenue responds well to any concerns I raise

The written feedback from the questionnaire covers a range of different points; many of thanks and gratitude and some others that I would like to try and address.

Common Points for discussion:

- The school has reviewed the competitive sports policy with some children, staff, Governors and a work party of parents. The policy was implemented a year ago and we will be revising the document again before we break up for the summer. I recognise that aspects of the policy need to be reconsidered and I appreciate the feedback parents have been providing. If you would like to offer any further helpful comments please do contact myself or Ms Watson.
- The leadership team are currently looking at a staggered homework system to provide differentiated levels; from the non-negotiable homework to the optional. This will be ready and in place for September.
- French is our second language taught in school. We deliver French formally from Year 2 to Year 6. Pupils are taught by our specialist teacher, Madame Chadier, or are taught by their class teachers. Year 3 are currently taught by their own class teacher, staff have been trained by Madame Chadier, and are also supported with the planning. We are very lucky to have so many French speaking staff in school.
- The school offers a wide range of extended school activities. We are often limited by the space available after school, which is why some clubs run over a lunch time. We review the club offer annually and would welcome any suggestions for additional clubs. Newly introduced, due to your feedback are: Hockey, additional Chess clubs, Mandarin.
- As a school we recognize the very fortunate position we are in and work hard to retain the staff that work at the school. We offer a range of professional development opportunities and a small part of that development is working with other schools. During the past three years we have supported three other local



schools; we have developed their leadership, teaching and learning, financial planning, and secured good pupil attainment and progress. Staff have gained the experience of supporting and learning from other schools' great practice. We have supported schools in shifting an Ofsted grade, promoted positive pupil progress and attainment and improved the quality of teaching. We have worked in school communities very different to our own and have brought valuable learning back to improve our own practice.

- The school lunch menu is reviewed termly we are constantly addressing meal choices, popular or not, with the kitchen to have meals that are liked by the vast majority. This term's menu was designed by the school Council following a taster session with the head of Accent Catering. Your children have been talking about their favourite school and home meals and these have been added to the summer term choice.
- The Forest School lessons are timetabled and we are currently training more class teachers to teach the Forest School approach. We currently have three teachers trained and are looking at increasing this to at least one teacher per year group to ensure pupils gain maximum usage of the space.
- Termly reports. We produce a report termly for English and Maths. These show the targets your child will be working on during the term ahead and are personalised to each child. The reports follow the teacher assessments and help to direct planning for the term ahead. We report on the Foundation subject attainment annually and the coverage through Curriculum Newsletters.
- The school has two main entrances and exits. The gates are time controlled and when open for long periods of time are manned by a staff member of the Rhodes team. In the mornings, for Breakfast Club, we only use the Rhodes Avenue entrance to enter and exit the school. This enables us to minimise the risk of unwanted visitors within the school grounds, ensuring pupils attending early morning clubs are safe. I recognise that having the Park gate closed adds additional time to your journey, however I will always ensure pupil safety comes first.
- We have increased the schools capacity to 60 pupils from 30 in Breakfast club and from 50 to 97 in our after school clubs. By reviewing our systems this increase has impacted on the school community positively – however we have now probably reached our full capacity.
- Parking continues to be a whole school issue. We have many parents or family
 members that drive to school, double park, turn in the school driveway or do not
 consider the safety of other road users or pedestrians. The school now places
 cones in front of drive ways and by the zigzag lines. We have noted car
 registration plates and asked for increased support by the Traffic Warden team. It
 is the responsibility of all drivers to consider others around the school entrance.


E - Safety

The school considers e-safety a vital part of safeguarding your children. The children are taught e-safety as part of the school's curriculum and deals with cyber bullying very seriously.

With the increased popularity of online gaming and social media ever changing I thought it would be useful to have an e-safety section in this month's newsletter. Only yesterday I was asked to confirm I was over the age of 16 years to use my WhatsApp account – due to the impending GDPR.
