
Headteacher's Newsletter - March 2023

<u>Adrian</u>

This half term has not been easy for our community. It was the beginning of a tough journey together and I am so proud of how the community has supported and continues to support one another through this difficult time. Community is one of Rhodes Avenue's school values and the sense of community felt this half term has been felt and appreciated by all whilst we all process our united loss. Thank you on behalf of the children and staff for helping one another. I know Adrian would have been proud of the unity of our community.

The school accessed the support of a trauma psychotherapist as soon as we heard about Adrian's death. The co-chairs of governors and I have worked with the psychotherapist on a whole school plan for the next few weeks and months. The co-chairs will shortly be gathering views regarding arrangements for a memorial for Adrian. One of the recommendations agreed with the psychotherapist is to communicate with parents about some of the activities/experiences children participated in on returning to school following Adrian's death.

When children returned to school this half term all classes increased the number of 'Ourselves and Others' sessions in school. Ourselves and Others sessions normally take place on a Thursday morning across the whole school and covers aspects of our PSED (Personal, Social and Emotional Development), PSHE (Personal, Social, Health and Economic Education) and RSHE (Relationships, Sex and Health Education). This term all classes in school increased the frequency of sessions in order to follow (at an age-appropriate level) the scaffold below recommended by the charity Winston's Wish.

Daffodils

Hedgehog children painted daffodils to remember Adrian. Adrian loved flowers.

Finding Nemo

One of Adrian's favourite films was Finding Nemo. Woodpecker children watched the film and produced a display.



Zones of regulation

Reception children explored zones of regulation. This is an approach used to support the development of self-regulation in children. It is an approach we already used in school but children across the school revisited this approach and used it to communicate how they were feeling.



The Colour Monster

'The Colour Monster' story and the associated coloured monsters was used to support children in exploring and identifying their emotions.



How do you feel?

Children in Reception explored how they felt using their very own colour monsters.



How I feel changes

Year 1 explored how their feelings change all of the time.



Flowers and fish

Year 1 made two of Adrian's favourite things – fish and flowers.



Fluttery butterflies

Year 1 wrote memories on their fluttery butterflies.



The Invisible String

Year 4 read 'The Invisible String' and connected their memories of Adrian together.



Memory Rainbow

Year 4 connected their memories of Adrian on a rainbow arch.



Paper Flowers

Year 3 made 3D flowers to remember Adrian.



Always in our hearts

Year 3 remembered Adrian and now that he will always be in their hearts.

Year 3 remembered memories they each had with Adrian.

Year 3 drew and decorated their own fish.

Year 5 produced posters about Adrian.
