We have continued to explore our core text 'This is Our House' by Michael Rosen. We have talked about the character's feelings and emotions and have focused on this by discussing the things that we like and don't like. We have thought about times when we have been cross like George in the story, and have spoken about alternative ways to deal with these feelings.

Our number of the week is 3.

In maths, we have been doing lots of counting and practising 1:1 correspondence by matching numerals to objects.

The key words we have focussed on so far are 'I' and 'a'.

This week we have been completing Reception Baseline Assessments, a statutory requirement. We do this through play with interesting objects and visuals. These assessments form part of our observations of the children and help us to target their individual learning journeys through our planning.

<u>Sharing a Story</u>

Sharing a story daily enhances your child's learning immensely. We ask that when you are reading a story, maybe before bedtime, that you ask questions about the text, e.g. How is the character feeling?; Can you think of a different ending to the story?; Are there any clues in the pictures?; etc. This helps children to understand the story and it develops comprehension and language skills.

To help your child develop their independence, we would appreciate if you could encourage them to put on their socks, shoes and coat independently. We have noticed that some children are finding this challenging. To develop these skills further, it is important to provide your child with opportunities to dress on their own, with your supervision. If they have accidents at school or have to change their clothes, it really helps if they know how to do aspects of this independently.
